FIVE GRAND AND CHANGE!!!

Our administrative assistant Arlene Hansroth has informed me that the 2020 Christmas Joy Offering, the last of the four annual denominational offerings the Presbyterian Church (USA) receives, brought in \$880, which was enough to put us over the \$5,000 mark for the year in terms of total contributions to these special offerings. So please give yourselves a hearty round of applause, especially when you consider the fact that I believe all four of these offerings (or at least three of them) technically ended up being received virtually because of the coronavirus pandemic, although I would have to go back and double check the calendar to be sure about that.

Just to review, the first of the four denominational offerings, the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering, generated \$2,505 in gifts to the church, the second offering, the Pentecost Offering, \$1,145, the third offering, the Peace and Global Witness Offering, \$540, and the Christmas Joy Offering \$880, for a grand total of \$5,070.

Because of your generosity, the larger church is in a better position to feed the hungry, help those effected by natural disasters, assist with the growth and development of young people, participate in efforts to pursue peace and reconciliation in the name of Jesus, meet the pressing financial needs of past and present church workers, and enable individuals of color to acquire knowledge and skills that will serve them well later.

So thank you for your generosity, and may God bless you for having shared some of the resources at your disposal in ministering to others through these special offerings.
