NEW GENERATION SINGERS COMING TO FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH!

The New Generation singers, known as New G, are a highly energetic group of high school and college students from St. Joseph. They love Jesus and they come from many different churches in St. Joseph. They're hard to define, in all the best of ways.

If we had to describe the New Generation singers in a song, what would it be? This is a serious challenge. The song would have to include 48 years. 48 states. Six Canadian provinces. Hundreds of alumni. Thousands of frozen pizzas sold. And thousands upon thousands of hours spent rehearsing, planning, writing, encouraging, listening and laughing across multiple faith denominations. Lots of laughing.

In fact, the singing is just the beginning. The students, ages eighth grade to early college, take on leadership positions and work on committees within the group, across the year, as they create and carry out their pinnacle two-week summer tour. Membership to New G is open to anyone within the age parameters, regardless of experience with singing.

"Many of our members do really enjoy singing, but some join us for the social aspects or to build their leadership skills. Others enjoy the planning, the writing of the shows, the production and the travel," says Byron Myers II, music director/leader/professional volunteer/alumni for New G since 1998. "And some students come to us out of sheer curiosity and end up staying. We enjoy all the kids, across all faiths, and it's always been a very open door." There's a legitimate sense of roots and of belonging in these words. Myers and his wife, Carol, are the second generation to lead the group. It was started by his parents, Byron and Phyllis Myers, in 1970. "At that time, a lot of Christian music groups were hitting the road and changing their format of their music. We were definitely one of many groups around. But we stayed and have continued to grow," he explains. Today, the group performs locally throughout the year and at several national (and international) locations along an annual two-week summer tour

OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE

Taking full advantage of the opportunity that had presented itself, our church was able to bring three members of the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance National Response Team to Leavenworth for our worship service Sunday, May 1.



Prior to the service the trio, the Rev. Richard Underdahl-Peirce of Minnesota, Marilyn Stone of Wisconsin and Phil Darby of Texas, joined Pastor Krista and about a dozen congregants in Fellowship Hall for a 30-minute slideshow presentation by Richard that amounted to an overview of PDA.

According to a promotional flier that was made available to those present, in 2021, 30 states and 15 countries shared \$3.1 million in PDA grants, 60 National Response Team members were deployed to 19 presbyteries, 112 Presbyterian women were trained in disaster preparedness, more than 500 people were served through 41 Emotional & Spiritual programs, and PDA helped with the collection and distribution of 191,182 Gift of the Heart kits and blankets in partnership with Church World Service. Richard, who is pictured here with Pastor Krista in Fellowship Hall, also talked about PDA during the service when it was time

for the Moment for Mission.

Richard, Marilyn and Phil were among 70 or so National Response Team members from throughout the United States who were in Kansas City, Mo., April 26-May 1 for a conference hosted by Heartland Presbytery.

PDA, which springs into action in the wake of both natural disasters and man-made disasters, is supported by the annual One Great Hour of Sharing offering, receiving roughly a third of what has been contributed by members and friends of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

LINCOLN, LINCOLN, BO-BIN-COLN ...

Our church was blessed by the presence of five members of the Association of Lincoln Presenters during our worship service Sunday, April 24.

Decked out in attire similar to that worn by America's 16th President - yes, these Abraham Lincolns even had a stovepipe hat, too - the five men who joined us in the sanctuary to praise Him who marches on were Murray Cox of Indiana, Joe Woodard and Randy Duncan of Illinois, and John King and John Cooper of Ohio.

Cooper masterfully delivered Lincoln's Gettysburg Address and also gave the history



behind that stirring Civil War-era song for the ages, "Battle Hymn of the Republic," which was sung by the congregation.

Following the service some of the Lincoln look-alikes made their way back up the center aisle and headed for the parlor to enjoy a little sustenance before they went their separate ways.

As he sampled what the table had to offer, Murray told me that he and his companions were among the approximately 30 members of the ALP who had assembled in Leavenworth for the organization's annual convention, its first in-person get-together since the start of the coronavirus pandemic. He said the group included 17 Lincolns and 10 Mrs. Lincolns.

A visit to the University of Saint Mary to view the collection of Lincoln memorabilia there and a side trip to Lecompton, once a pro-slavery stronghold, also were part of the convention.
