

Henri Nouwen, priest and teacher, said that if pastors do not know what is absolutely essential for them to do, they will do the merely important. There are many important acts of ministry that churches and pastors are called upon to provide. What is most important? The answer depends, to a great extent, not only on what we believe about Jesus but also about what we believe about our present context. Jesus, when confronted with a whole array of needs, decides that his first response to the people will be teaching.

Growing up in Winfield, Kansas, my parents did not worry whether or not I would grow up Christian. After all, ours was the only game in town. Everybody we knew was Christian. One became a Christian, not by intentional, careful, and caring Christian education, but rather by osmosis, by being lucky enough to live in our community. We went to Sunday school and youth group to uncover our feelings about God, to learn to be "nicer" than we already were, to spend time with our friends. We were Christians and it was good to be part of the church. It was our world. Or at least that is what we thought.

That is no longer true. We are not the only game in town. The church is likely to be ignored by much of the world. There is no longer Christian faith by osmosis. If our children are to grow up Christian, we will have to intentionally form them into this faith. The future belongs to congregations that take their education needs seriously. In so many ways, people in the world are "like sheep without a shepherd." We have good news to share! However, people do not hear if no one teaches who God really is and what God is doing in the world and how much God's loves us and all creation.

That is why I am excited that Sunday school for elementary children will begin this Sunday at 9:30am, in the upstairs class room. That is why I am excited we will have a youth intern from Heartland Center coming to help us with programing for both our youth and kids. We have good news to share with those who are lonely and with those who feel very much at home in FPC. I ask all of our members to pray regularly for the work that we are doing with our young people and to find ways to help and support this important ministry of our congregation.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Who are we?

Presbyterian Women (PW) is a church wide organization whose membership is open to all women of the Presbyterian Church (USA) who choose to participate in or be supportive of PW in any way. PW intentionally seeks the membership of women from all racial ethnic groups so that the organization reflects a vision of the whole church as a community of mutual inter-dependence in which diversity contributes to wholeness.

Presbyterian Women is organized at all levels of the PC (USA) – in congregations, presbyteries and synods as well as General Assembly. This connectional system all ideas and information to continually flow back and forth to strengthen the work of PW and the ministry of the PC (USA).

What do we do in this Congregation?

Presbyterian Women in the Congregation functions through PW "circles" – small groups that gather regularly to provide an inclusive, caring community of women. Circle leadership is elected, appointed and volunteered by each circle annually. At First Presbyterian we have four circles:

We meet each month – September through May. Our study this year is <u>God's Promise: I Am with You</u> by Amy Poling Sutherlun. This Bible study approaches God's promise, to be with us in good times and bad and to never forsake us, through examples in the Old and New Testaments.

We organize Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Ministry. And we look for and support local ministries. We bought the freezer that is used for our Community Meals program, and have supplied the kitchen with dishes, glassware, silverware, pots, pans and utensils. 
